In the old inscriptions (cf. Elephantine) an original d is substituted by a דחא-(חא) ז in Aramaic, חא "to grasp" in Hebrew; an original ț is transcribed by a צ (אציכ)-אטיק in Aramaic, ציקה ("the summer") in Hebrew; an original đ is transcribed by a ע = ק in Aramaic, e.g., אקרא; an original ț is transcribed as ת = ש in Aramaic, e.g., רושא = רותא ("Assyria").

General Aramaic is the comprehensive name for numerous dialects of a Northwest Semitic language closely related to Hebrew and Arabic, first attested in inscriptions dating from the ninth to

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eight centuries B. C., and still spoken today.

This has reflected in the Hebrew language as large parts of Hebrew were borrowed from Aramaic. Nehemiah 13:24 shows that both natives began to intermarry, which subsequently led to "Aramaization" of Hebrew. By 300 BC, Aramaic was already included in the Jewish literature. However, Hebrew retained its status as a religious language.

Alongside Aramaic, Hebrew co-existed within Israel as a spoken language. Most scholars now date the demise of Hebrew as a spoken language to the end of the Roman Period, or about 200 CE. It continued on as a literary language down through the Byzantine Period from the 4th century CE. The exact roles of Aramaic and Hebrew remain hotly debated.

Conversely, Aramaic words, such as mām̄môn "wealth", were borrowed into Hebrew, and Hebrew words acquired additional senses from Aramaic. For instance, Hebrew רָאוּ rā'ûi "seen" borrowed the sense "worthy, seemly" from the Aramaic ḥzî meaning "seen" and "worthy".

In contrast, the royal inscriptions were written mostly in three languages and in cuneiform writing systems (Old Persian, Elamite, Babylonian; sometimes also in Hieroglyphic Egyptian and Aramaic).

And nearly all of the extant coins that date from the 4th century BC until the Bar Kochba Revolt (AD 135) are embossed in Hebrew (not Aramaic). Inscriptions on pottery vessels, tombs, and other items likewise attest that Hebrew was the spoken and written language of the common people.
