Written when she was about 42 years old, Woolf had considerable experience with illness when she penned "On Being Ill," having been in and out of mental hospitals several times. Indeed, she wrote the essay while ill in bed. In her lengthy piece, Woolf considers the place of illness in then-modern literature and culture. She begins the piece:

Over the course of "On Being Ill," Woolf strikingly refigures illness experience as transformative: beyond merely the effects of microbes, illness harbors the potential for "spiritual change" and the revelation of otherwise "undiscovered countries" – vast bodily territories laden with sensations and

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energies accessible only when the body is no longer healthy (3).

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On Being III

Virginia Woolf (1882-1941) knew illness intimately. She lost her mother at the age of 13, and the scenes of the illness that took her away lingered in Woolf's mind for a long time. In 1906, she lost her favourite brother, Thoby Stephen, to typhoid fever (an illness he had contracted after a trip to Greece). He was only 26 at the time.
